LEADERSHIP IS HARD. INTEGRATIVE LEADERSHIP IS HARDER.

In the U.S., as in many countries, the business, government, and nonprofit sectors all touch important social issues like housing and clean air. Integrative leadership—leadership that involves the sectors working together to make positive change on such issues—involves multiple players, complex settings, and inter-dependencies. It's hard to organize and hard to sustain, but in a shared-power, no-one-wholly-in-charge world, it's often necessary to make an impact, both within and outside your chosen profession.

DEVELOP ESSENTIAL KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS.

This program will prepare you to lead and contribute to cross-sector and other cross-boundary (inter-agency, inter-professional, inter-disciplinary) initiatives. You'll enrich your understanding of the sectors and the organizations within them as well as of the theory and practice of cross-sector leadership. You'll have the opportunity to think about what it means to lead within, from, and outside of your chosen profession, and you'll be able to develop your cross-sector leadership competencies—your skills in communicating across difference, moving from idea to action without a playbook, and working together outside of established organizations or hierarchies—with graduate students from other Schools and Colleges as well as your own.

HOW TO APPLY

Prior admission into an established master's, doctoral, or graduate professional degree program is required. Credits from required courses in a student's major program will not count towards the minor for both master and Ph.D. students. To apply for the minor, students must fill out the ILM application form. This form must be signed by David Weerts, Director of Graduate Studies for the Integrative Leadership minor. Students must demonstrate relevant academic background and experience.
